The library celebrated February's Black History Month through readings, writings, and discussion of both primary sources and secondary sources. Students, faculty, and staff were invited to follow the trail of history of those who have preceded us: the images, manuscripts, notes, diaries, and articles that document lives and events.

The BHCC library's goal is to empower students, faculty and staff to relive a struggle, to feel a triumph, to share an emotion through the paths that history has left us.

As in the past, this year the BHCC library organized book displays and participated in college-wide celebration events. Two of these events took place in the library:

February 11 *Voices: A Continuous Reading of Writing by Frederick Douglass* was a marathon reading of the famed abolitionist's works. Sponsored by the Museum of African American History and hosted by the Library and the Mary L. Fifield Art Gallery, students, faculty, and staff gathered in the library to both listen to readings and to participate by reading out loud some of Douglass's most powerful words. The event took place from 1:00pm to 5:00pm.

At the archives, we had the opportunity to handle items such as the manuscripts and notes of Martin Luther King, Jr. from 1951 to 1955 when he was a graduate student at Boston University.

In order to share our experience with the BHCC community, we put together a book display containing many of the titles that Dr. King read while he was a student at BU. Primary sources help to bring history alive. Library assistant Alexey Kozlov put together a video of our visit which can be viewed on the online guide.

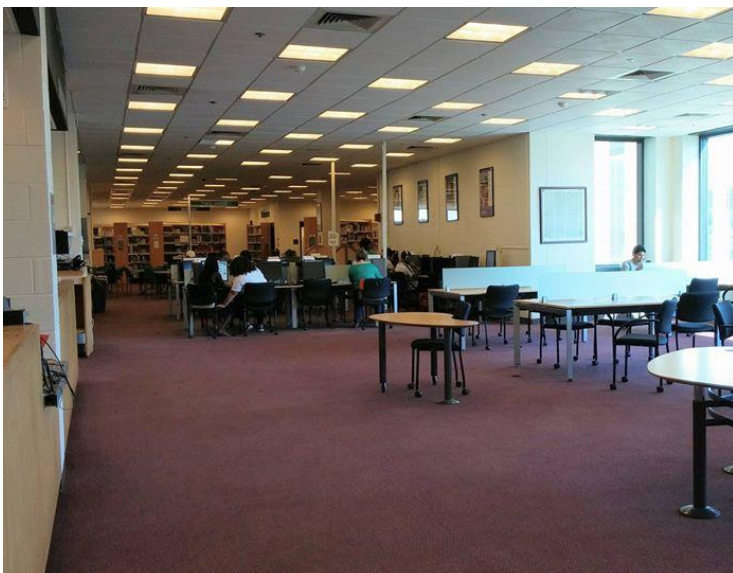
